## Victory for Free Speech TV

There is a new TV channel available here in Ashland. "Democracy Now" Is offered through AFN. We are still pounding the drums for this new offering. When it comes to news and information, we need more voices! Free Speech TV is the place where informed people go to get all the news, not just what the networks want us to see. "Democracy Now" and the Free Speech network are now being seen on Channel 81 on AFN, thanks to residents and the members of the Ashland Fiber Network Programming Committee, chaired by Wes Brain.

"We have a consolidated media that is very homogenized. In fact, the news that comes to us is missing is a lot of information that is not reported to us. Democracy Now! gives us news that is seen around the world that sometimes is not reported here in this country. It is important for our democracy. For people to be able to vote and participate in democracy, they need to be informed."

"Democracy Now," the main program on Free Speech TV, is hosted by Amy Goodman. Many people say Amy Goodman is the best progressive journalist in this country. She is with the Pacifica Network, WBAI in New York. It is a radio program but they put a camera on Amy and Free Speech TV carries her live at 5 a.m. Pacific Time. Goodman's show is also rebroadcast twice daily for those who do not rise early. Free Speech TV is only available in Ashland through AFN or by Dish Network satellite service. It literally took the five years of operation to get the program on the air.

When the committee first got together we had a blank blackboard where we would put what channels we wanted on AFN. One of the first programs that went on the board was Free Speech TV. It wasn't easy to get. It is

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

# From the Staff of Peace House

## The Criminalization of Dissent

We have entered a time of historic repression in our country. The abuses of the PATRIOT Act are well known and documented, despite the government and mainstream media's attempts to keep it under wraps. Our own friend Pete Seda has had his name linked to terrorism in the media, despite the fact that he has always been a consistent voice for peace, and no criminal charges have ever been filed. His story is, unfortunately, not unique.

What the PATRIOT Act has brought to Muslim-American community members, has long occurred in communities of color throughout our country. Racial profiling by law enforcement officials is a common and well known problem in our cities and towns. Additionally, the FBI's COINTELPRO program first targeted American Indian Movement members and Black Panther Party members, then moved to student anti-war activists. The continuum of repression has now reached a dangerous pinnacle that threatens us all.

Lessor known abuses of power occur on a daily basis throughout this country. Quietly, law enforcement officials have created and implemented plans to further criminalize dissent, threatening to undermine the noble foundation of civil disobedience and protest that is the core and origin of any vibrant democracy.

Using fear as a motivator and excuse, the media's consistent portrayal of protest as unpatriotic, or somehow indirectly supporting terrorists, adds to the criminalization of dissent by demonizing those who would dare exercise their rights to free speech and assembly and speak out against injustice.

Of course this is not news to you. Maybe you have heard stories of the thousands of militarized police that greeted FTAA protesters with intimidation, harassment and reckless violence in Miami last fall. Maybe you have heard stories of how the governor of Georgia declared a "state of emergency" one week before G8 protesters were set to arrive, effectively eliminating 1st Amendment rights and allowing law enforcement to detain and disrupt any event or individual anywhere in the state.

And perhaps you have even witnessed yourself the heavy-handed police tactics at anti-war demonstrations in San Francisco, or of our own local law enforcement at student peace rallies and timber sale protests. All of this leads the ordinary person to question their ability to participate in the movements against injustice. The days of nonviolent civil disobedience and protest are in danger of rapidly disappearing.

With major protests at the DNC and RNC set to occur later this summer on the east coast and the likelihood of ongoing protest on our public lands forests here in Oregon, it is imperative that we do whatever we can to stop the criminalization of dissent. We must

stand firmly behind every person's right to non-violently resist injustices.



# Book Review



**Power Politics** by Arundhati Roy South End Press

Howard Zinn says, "Arundhati Roy combines her brilliant style as a novelist with her powerful commitment to social justice in producing these eloquent, penetrating essays." She challenges the idea that only "experts" can speak out on such urgent matters as the globalization of the world economy, the privatization of India's power supply by U.S.-based energy companies, and the construction of monumental dams that will dislocate hundreds of thousands of people. Roy takes us to the frontlines of struggles for social justice and a humane, democratic future."

Although she's speaking of India, her words apply to our upcoming election: "We will be forced to ask ourselves some very uncomfortable questions about our values and traditions, our vision of the future, our responsibilities as citizens, the legitimacy of our democratic institutions, the role of the state, the police, the army, the judiciary, and the intellectual community." To that I would add our elected leaders and our corporate leaders.

## Vietnam Archival Volunteer Needed

Peace House has received several donations of archival material relating to U.S. militarism, the Vietnam War and the peace movement from 1960 and onward. We are in need of an experienced archival volunteer who can donate their time and effort to assist Peace House in preserving this material for future generations of peace activists. This work will include deciding what materials will be needed to accomplish this project and then proceeding to organize, label and display the materials. Peace House will purchase the necessary materials for this project.

"Trade Not Aid" is the rallying cry of the headmen of the new Global Village head-quartered in the shining offices of the World Trade Organization. Our British colonizers stepped onto our shores a few centuries ago disguised as traders. ... This time around the colonizer doesn't even need a token white presence in the colonies. ... They can have their colonies and an easy conscience. 'Creating a good investment climate' is the new euphemism for third world repression."

She said advocates of globalization, from Kofi Annan to individual nation leaders, claim that "if we have the right institutions of governance in place—effective courts, good laws, honest politicians, participatory democracy, a transparent administration that respects human rights and gives people a say in decisions that affect their lives—then the globalization process will work for the poor, as well. They call this 'globalization with a human face.'"

"The point is, if all this were in place, almost anything would succeed: socialism, capitalism, a dictatorship, you name it. Everything works in Paradise... But in an imperfect world, is it globalization that's going to bring us all this bounty? "She points out India's rural economy supports seven hundred million people who are producing more food grain, milk, sugar than the country uses while living at bare subsistence incomes. Yet in 2001 the Indian government made an agreement with the WTO to drop its quantitative import restrictions on 1,400 commodities when there was already a glut of many of these products on the market. India is free to export but countries like the USA claim their products don't meet the first world's "environmental standards."

Roy's book is a plea for citizens of every country to look at the big picture in their country and the world and do the most effective things one can do. Seek out neighbors and build community to create humane changes needed. "I think it's vital to de-professionalize the public debate on matters that vitally affect the lives of ordinary people. It's time to snatch our futures back from the "experts." She cites encouraging actions by individuals and small community groups. "One cannot help but marvel at the fantastic range and depth and wisdom of the hundreds of people's resistance movements all over the country. They're being beaten down, but they simply refuse to lie down and die."

"What we need to search for and find, to hone and perfect into a magnificent, shining thing, is a new kind of politics. Not the politics of governance, but the politics of resistance. The politics of opposition. The politics of forcing accountability. The politics of slowing things down. The politics of joining hands across the world and preventing certain destruction. In the present circumstances, I'd say that the only thing worth globalizing is dissent. It's India's best export."

## Why Does Peace House Support Us DUDEs?

DUDE (Disabled United in Distressing Environments) is an aggressive advocacy group for the disabled, and primarily by the disabled, that has been active since November 2003. Being against discrimination of any kind, we also welcome TABs (Temporarily Able-Bodied).

Our biggest event so far has been a disability sit-in rally last April in the Medford Disability Service Office. The success of this event is directly attributed to the fact that we formed a coalition of three disability groups and six groups fighting for social justice. One active member of this coalition was Peace House, whose co-director, Linda Richards, trained us in nonviolent protesting.

The event attracted 120 people, being the largest of its kind in Rogue Valley history. The training was so effective that the three police officers, assigned to check what trouble we the riff-raff were causing, ended up being bored stiff.

The success of this event is continuing as we speak. We have submitted a list of demands, which is now under serious consideration by high-level officials of the Department of Human Services. The DHS director and his deputy will be in the area in the next few weeks, and will meet us, the disabled, for detailed discussions. For the first time we have some say in our own fate, and we are no longer just passive recipients of orders from above. Without the coalition none of that would have ever happened.

Why is the Peace House, involved mostly in anti-war activities, even interested in us the disabled? Simply because we are front-line war casualties. When our country wastes its resources on destroying other countries, then compounds the problem by "rebuilding" their nations, we sadly become the first to pay the price. Our main usefulness is being a warning, a red flag to those coming next

It is critically important to maintain and enhance the coalition that was formed. In our case we are now trying to draw in caregivers and SEIU activists, as well as church and religious groups. We also hope that we will be able to repay some coalition members in kind when called for.

## **Endangered Forests, Endangered Freedoms**

The summer before a major presidential election has developed into a season to challenge extreme federal policies. One can find workers in Michigan struggling with economic policies that moved their jobs oversees, parents in Texas coping with the death of their children in Afghanistan, and Greenpeace USA protesting ancient forest destruction on public lands here in southwest Oregon.

Greenpeace USA set up the nation's first Forest Rescue Station in early June in the Kelsey-Whisky timber sale on Medford BLM near the Wild and Scenic Rogue River. The group has initiated a national campaign under the banner, "Endangered Forests, Endangered Freedoms," marrying two threats that may at first appear separate. Yet this administration is unleashing unprecedented pressures on our civil liberties, environmental laws, reproductive rights, and freedoms of speech and

Greenpeace has a 30-year history of peaceful direct action opposing nuclear proliferation, destructive ocean fishing, global warming, persistent organic pollutants and forest destruction. Greenpeace maintains strict nonviolence codes and generates creative communication techniques that demand attention to imperative environmental issues.

In February 2002, Greenpeace volunteers carried out a peaceful protest against a cargo ship transporting illegal mahogany from the Brazilian Amazon. Rather than arrest the ship captain for transporting illegal mahogany, the Bush administration brought charges against Greenpeace.

The office of US Attorney General John Ashcroft argued that their actions broke an 1872 law designed to stop prostitutes tempting sailors off ships. In May 2004, the judge threw out the prosecutors' case before the trial was finished for lack of evidence. The Bush administration attempted to use this law, last enforced in 1890, to stifle free

speech and the practice of non-violent civil disobedience intended to highlight an illegal and immoral action.

A rich history of civil disobedience is a part of the foundation of our nation. Luckily, groups like Greenpeace exist to remind us that we can take a physical stand against what we know deep in our hearts to be wrong. They also remind us that different struggles are actually quite interrelated. From the Miami civil liberties trial, Greenpeace staff set their sights on the Pacific Northwest to continue their job, undeterred by Ashcroft's attempts to scandalize their actions against logging in the Amazon.

The Greenpeace USA campaign is committed to ending the commercial logging of oldgrowth and mature forest on public lands. The Klamath-Siskiyou is rare in its botany and geology, and is threatened by the same misguided administration that attacks the Tongass in Alaska and the Jefferson and Washington National Forests in Virginia.

Two weeks after Greenpeace set up their Forest Rescue Station at Kelsey-Whisky, they placed a three-ton shipping container on a Medford BLM logging road to block ancient forest logging at the Soukow timber sale, west of Glendale. The Greenpeace supporters who locked themselves to the container were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct and interfering with an agricultural operation. As this goes to print, the Medford BLM has given Greenpeace 48 hours to deconstruct and vacate their Forest Rescue Station at Kelsey-Whisky. Whatever Greenpeace does next, I am confident they will continue to call attention to the injustices done to the environment by our government and in our name.

## Another Chance to Say YES! To Peace House

staff and board made calls from Patricia Sprague Realty to our Peace House supporters. We explained that we were seeking support for existing programs like Uncle Foods Diner which has served nutritious meals to homeless and low-income people for over 12 years and new programs like the Walker Peace Garden program that will educate children about their relationship to food and community through an innovative garden-tokitchen experience. We spoke about our commitment to grassroots organizing, consensus decision making, addressing the root causes of violence and oppression and our dedication to keeping Peace House a community-led nonprofit.

We also sought your input, asking what suggestions you had for making Peace House an improved organization. Those of you we conversed with were tremendously affirmative, expressing that through your donations and 99% positive feedback. Thanks to all who made a contribution to continue our work! We raised nearly \$3,000 and checks have been steadily coming in.

However, many of you were not home! So we're giving you a second chance to keep Peace House active and successful. Our 2004 annual budget is \$107,000. Most of our programs are provided for through specific donations and grants. In order to organize these programs and offer aid to community members and groups, we need financial support to pay for the less glamorous things; like rent, phone bills, accountant fees and staff time. In order to publish and mail Clear Actions alone we need \$10,000.

In order to assure that our impressive goals and programs for 2004 are realized, we must raise \$50,000 in direct contributions. To date, we've collected almost \$13,000, leaving \$37,131 remaining. To make this happen, Peace House board and staff have developed a detailed fundraising strategy and calendar for 2004. Among our plans are bringing back by popular demand the Annual Peace House Spaghetti Dinner, a benefit Phil Ochs tribute concert and silent auction, a major donor campaign, publicizing our endowment fund, a fall raffle, and a school-year-kickoff freestyle competition and dance. More are in the works. We're scoping the possibility of bringing Norman Solomon and Daniel Ellsberg on September 24th and hosting a slideshow on Tibet. If you're interested in serving on the fundraising committee, we welcome your involvement.

For the most part, the pledge drive was a success; however we did not succeed in getting sufficient monthly or quarterly pledges from Peace House supporters. If each one of you that receives this newsletter pledged \$23.81 we would raise the \$37,131 needed to meet our budget for the year. If you are able to make a tax deductible contribution, please do so soon. The second phase of our fundraising drive is sending out a written appeal at the beginning of July. You'll get a letter from the staff and board talking about our programs, budget and needs with a return envelope enclosed. When you get it, you'll know what to do; say YES to Peace House and send a





## The Abdill-Ellis Center Update

The Abdill-Ellis Center in Ashland, Oregon is currently Oregon's only lesbian, gay bisexual and transgender (LGBT) resource center, so when news came from the Board of Directors that they may close the Center the community came out in droves. The two issues at hand were about money and logistics. The result of these challenges was a redesigning and revitalizing of the organiza-

The challenges were met with a force from the community, invoking new enthusiasm and commitment. Through a series of fundraising events and private donations, the needed funds were raised within a few months. Shortly thereafter, the new location at Ashland's Historic Armory was found and the Center moved on May 15.

In celebration of the continuation of the Abdill-Ellis center, a hugely successful weeklong LGBT Pride event took place during June 4 – June 13, focusing on building community. At the center of 'Pride Week' was the Abdill-Ellis annual meeting, held to plan for the year ahead. With the largest turnout in over five years there was much discussion and emotion about the importance of our LGBT community center and the direction it should take. Six new board members were appointed to the nine member board, changing the face of the Center.

The need of youth support and education was overwhelmingly addressed by the community. With the cooperation of the QRC at SOU and other youth organizations in the Rogue Valley, the next year for the Center could be called the Year of the Young. The Center is planning a wide range of support and activities for queer and questioning youth, including a focus on safety and tolerance on high school and college campuses throughout the valley.

The finale of the week was the Pride picnic in the park. Nearly 200 picnickers adorned the lawn at the Lithia Park band shell. Speakers for marriage rights, AIDS support and youth programs all echoed the importance of community and of voting. Getting out the vote was emphasized, especially as the religious right is organizing the so-called defense of marriage act, which would write a Women In Black ban on gay marriages into the Oregon Constitution.

This Pride event was the kickoff to a very exciting year at the Abdill-Ellis center. The membership has grown enormously and the center is developing strong relationships with other LGBT and friend organizations in the area. It is a great time for enthusiastic human rights campaigners to jump on board. There is a lot of work to do during this election year and there is tons of energy at the Abdill-Ellis center to support that effort.
